

Please do discuss this with your children to reinforce the messages we raise in school. As a headteacher I have dealt with various situations where year 5 and 6 pupils have had upsetting experiences using social media at this age. I firmly believe parents must make the decisions for their children and it is not for school to police or preach to parents. However we do feel it is appropriate to provide supporting materials and information to support parents in their decision making. We have sent home support sheets to share with parents to all of Year 5 this week. Please do access the website if you require more information. 



# Which is the hardest times table to learn?

8 x 4 = 32 7 x 8 = 56 11 x 12 = 132 9 x 7 = 63

The diagram below shows the times tables which are most challenging for children to learn and the ones they find easy to remember. (red being the hardest) With this in mind we encourage our teachers to focus on teaching the most challenging times tables specifically, as well as learning tables off by heart and playing games. Sometimes it takes a bit of creativity, fun and perseverance to really make this secure for our children.
